




Non-participation, or better-stated, involuntary participation is embedded in the social condition of women the world over This is not less true now, nor is there any less violence against women now, than when began exploring these issues in art. The American writer Susan Griffin wrote in 1971

"I have never been free of the fear rape. From a very early age I, like me women, have thought of rape as part of in natural environment...(but) the subject is rarely discussed...that one begins to suspea conspiracy of silence." In the 1970s th silence received a major challenge as work wide women begins to come foreward.

Mass media was used to alert an audience beyond the art world. The question of benefit – personal or social, perceived or measurable – is of an entirely different order. Whether or not, in extra social, perceived or measurable – is of an entirely different order. Whether or not, in fact, and should be of tangible benefit is debated. In relatively small and localized sites, visual art calls attention to issues and perspectives that are not heard elsewhere. Artists engage deeply, offering inspiration and support to people outside the arts through simple witnessing. While is insilized by that art will topple a government, exchanges and interactions on the street (and electronically transmitted as in Tehran American et al. 1997). And art of small exchanges might offer unforesceable yet nevertheless profound consequences. Sausa Griffin spoke of early organizing on violence against women, "We did not move from theory; we moved quite simply from the sorest wounds, and in this sense we were no longer 'thinking...i.m the realm where thought is divided from feeling and objectivity is imagined to exist...yet these small changes in the doing of things were in themselves a feat. And they do heralf more to come. Because the making of changes inside as were not samely, we were profoundly different now than we had been before. '(1)
